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FOREWORD

This, the most popular of Oscar Wilde's plays, was first produced in 1895. It has retained its appeal ever since as a piece of light satire on ladies who are over-particular in their choice of lovers, and of gentlemen whose outward respectability belies their secret adventures. The Honourable Gwendolen Fairfax will have no one for a husband unless his name be Ernest. John Worthing, Esq., J.P., assumes that name to win her, and his one fabrication leads to endless others. The untangling of this tissue of untruths gives point to the title of the play, in which "Earnest" is an adjective, not a proper noun.
